# GBVI Indicators

Indicator	Description
P12.5.D	Number of people reached by an individual, small group, or community-level intervention or service that explicitly addresses gender-based violence and coercion
P12.6.D	Number of GBV service-encounters at a health facility
P12.7.D	Percentage of health facilities with gender-based violence and coercion services available
GEND_GBV	Number of people receiving post-GBV care




# GBVI Scope and Reach

<b>P12.5.D: Individuals reached (FY 2012 and 2013)</b>	1,241,150
<b>GEND_GBVI: Number of people receiving post-GBV care (FY 2014)</b>	76,528
<b>Total number of individuals reached (FY 2012-2014)</b>	1,317,678

# Lessons Learned – Country Level

## **Coordination and Collaboration**

- Create a strategic national-level “master plan”
- Broad stakeholder collaboration
- Focus on coordination and communication
- Create and strengthen multi-sectoral synergies at all levels



# Lessons Learned – Country Level

## **Programming and Service Delivery**

- Build capacity and awareness at all levels
- Engage the broader community
- Develop simple monitoring plans with coordinated data collection tools and indicators



# Lessons Learned – Country Level

## **Country Ownership & Sustainability**

- Use a phased approach to develop and roll out programming
- Integrate GBV into standard health package
- Harmonize GBV/HIV prevention and response with local government structures



# Lessons Learned – Global Level

1. Political will and leadership commitment on the part of leadership is key.
2. Decentralized funding facilitated the success of the GBVI model.
3. Establishing a baseline and understanding country context are necessary.
4. Centralized M&E systems and communication structures are important.
